





A Land Code at a Glance Summary

There are 9 Sections in this Land Code:

Part 1. Preliminary Matters

This introduces the Land code to the reader and defines how the document should be read. There is a description of the terms that will be used in the document, an explanation of where the authority to govern comes from, what the purpose of the land code is and what lands the land code applies to (the reserve land description).

Part 2. First Nations Legislation

This section outlines what law making power "X" First Nation will have out of the land code and the procedure for how new land laws will be created and implemented (including where they will be published and when they take effect) under the land code.

Part 3. Community Consultation and Approvals

This section defines how and what the process is for implementing various elements of the land code. For example, approving a "X" First Nation land use plan or enacting land laws requires community approval under the conditions defined in this section. Furthermore, this section touches on the procedures for a "meeting of members", and the ratification process and approval thresholds are for passing laws or other matters such as: i.e. development of a heritage site, amendment to the land code, or any other matter.

Part 4. Protection of Land

This section outlines some of the key protections the land code offers- and the special conditions by which the "X" First Nation could expropriate land (only by community approval through ratification vote) and the conditions for calculating compensation, but also the rights that may not be expropriated. This section also defines the necessity for a law on heritage sites, and ensures no development or amendment can be made to the land use plan to get rid of a heritage site created under this law. Finally this section states that an agreement is necessary for "X" First Nation to exchange land with another party (i.e. First Nation, Province, and Federal Government) and there are conditions to be met for lands to be received (such as the need for an appointed negotiator, freedom of receiving additional compensation or land in trust, and federal commitment to add any lands to the existing reserve base).

Part 5. Accountability

This section really has to do with how the land code is administered by "X" First Nation including the rules for a "conflict of interest" and the duty to report and abstain from participation in land matters where there is a conflict. Also in the context of conflict of interest this section defines the non-application of these rules for common interests, dealing with disputes and penalties.

This section also applies to how financial management, audit and financial reporting will be conducted – establishing separate lands bank accounts, signing officers, bonding, signing authorities, and the adoption of the fiscal year for operations and reporting. This

financial policy. The final part of this section is about financial records and the member's right to access information on year to year financial statements, audit report, the annual report on lands, and the penalties for interference or obstructing the inspection of these records by another member- and the coordination and roles responsible for creating and making these documents public (i.e. auditor and council).

section also goes into detail about the specific rules for a year to year lands budget and

Part 6. Land Administration

This section starts off by establishing the lands committee- it defines the composition, eligibility requirements, selection method, and term of office and dealing with vacancies. This section also will define how revenue monies from lands will be handled (from fees, leases etc.) and how the registration of land interests (leases, permits, licenses) will be conducted and how it is captured through First Nations Land Registry System (FNLRS) and a duplicate register if directed.

Part 7. Interests in Land

This section relates more to the operation of the "X" First Nation lands administration and how it will address existing (CPs) and new land related interests (new CPs or allocations). This section defines that there will need to be written documents, standards created, and that consent will be necessary to process any granting or disposing of assignments of land. This section defines the rights of CP holders and the procedure for cancelling a CP, the transfer and use of a CP, and the situation when a CP holder ceases to be a member. This section also defines the limits on mortgages and seizures, transfers upon death, and the principles for spousal property law.

Part 8. Dispute Resolution

This section is created to address how possible disputes that could arise by any benefactor (member of "X" First Nation) of the land code and how the process for addressing disputes will be conducted. For example an adjudicator would be established to resolve disputes in relation to lands unless members could come to some resolve by way of an informal resolution of disputes. The section sets out the powers for the adjudicator, adjudication procedures and decisions and the member's ability to appeal these decisions and expectations around costs.

Part 9. Other Matters

This section defines four items (could be more) to address common issues such as:

- •Liability- the need for director and officers insurance for land committee members,
- Offences and enforcement- what are offences and what is the penalty,
- •Amendments to Land Code- specifically the process for amending this land code,
- •Commencement- defines when the actual start date will be.

Tribal Chief Report

Water Use Plan – A meeting to go over BC Hydro's Capital Plan and BC Hydro's Water development Plan was scheduled for January 29. It is very short notice and a more reasonable time frame is being requested.

5 Year Review- The St'at'imc Chiefs Council, St'at'imc Government Services and Steering Committee and Legal representatives met to review the Agreements that were made with BC Hydro. A committee is being put together to work on the issues from the 5-year review. The committee members are Chief Frances Alec, Chief Micah Thevarge, Chief Ida Peter, Chief Susan James, and Chief Michelle Edwards. Chief Susan represents the SGS on the committee. They will come back with an approach to working on the issues, come up with a budget, costs, and expected outcomes, goals, etc.

Treaties –A letter was drafted for the St'at'imc Chiefs Council to review and send to Minister Carolyn Bennett, Minister of Crown Indigenous Relations and Northerns Affairs Canada and to Scott Fraser, Ministry of Aboriginal Relations and Reconciliation Canada. This is in response to the governments' refusal to remove the overlap considerations that they have imposed, supporting other nations who are claiming parts of St'at'imc Territory as part of their treaty area. A copy of the letter will be distributed once it is formally approved by the SCC.

St'at'imc/BC Hydro Dispute Resolution – Ongoing. Confidential report included in PC package.

St'at'imc Chiefs Council-There was not an SCC meeting in January. A St'at'imc Authority meeting was held to deal with the 5 Year Review. The issue of overall Nation Structure is one that continues to pop up. The structure an knowing clearly what that looks like is critical as well to sorting out the issues from the 5 year review.

Fisheries – No new information on the planned harvest agreement worked on by the Leadership Council. I attended a BC Wild Salmon Conference in September. A 43 page report has just been received on the meeting. If anyone is interested, please ask Sid for a Copy.

Lillooet Tribal Council – Ongoing

Recognition and Implementation of Rights Framework-

Environmental Assessment Revitalization – Ongoing

Referrals– Ongoing. Interwest is in the beginning stages of planning in the Texas Creek area. An initial meeting was held to get an update on the area involved. This will give PC time to research impacts to cultural, environment, wildlife, etc.

PGWG - The governance working group continues to meet to work on issues from their mandate. PGWG has been meeting with BCTS and working towards a protocol agreement. A proposal was reviewed for management and monitoring of forestry as well as planning in our areas of responsibility. The PGWG is also redrafting the PGWG Terms of Reference to present to PC. It was felt that PGWG is doing much more than the original mandate.



Framework Agreement on First Nation Land Management

Land Governance Jurisdiction

Framework Agreement First Nations have the recognized legal authority to:

- **design, administer and enforce laws** for the development, conservation, protection, management and use of their reserve lands and resources;
- **govern their reserve lands** with all the powers of an owner, except that title remains with Canada, protected under section 91.24 of the Canada Constitution, and therefore any alienation of these lands is prohibited; and
- **collect and manage revenues** derived from their reserve lands and resources, in accordance with their land code.

Economic Development Opportunities

Framework Agreement First Nations are responding to economic development opportunities at the speed of business, as the following statistics indicate:

- more than \$50 million invested in member-owned businesses on reserve:
- more than \$100 million invested by third-parties businesses on reserve;
- more than 2,000 employment opportunities for band members on reserve; and
- more than 10,000 employment opportunities for non-members on reserve.

Why is the Framework Agreement so successful?

The *Framework Agreement*, which was developed by First Nations:

continues to be led by First Nations, not Canada;

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- protects the title to reserve lands and resources for future generations;
- demonstrates successful and sustainable economic development; and
- demonstrates jurisdiction, decision-making, and control are in the hands of the Community, not Canada.

Background

- Under the *Indian Act*, the Minister is obligated to exercise decision-making authority over First Nation reserve lands and resources
- In 1992 a small group of Chiefs began planning for an alternative which would replace Ministerial control with Community control
- The Chiefs' solution was a government-to-government agreement, which would provide their members with the option of drafting their own land code and land laws to replace the Minister's land-related obligation under the *Indian Act*
- In February 1996 the Chiefs signed the *Framework Agreement on First Nation Land Management* with the Minister of Indian Affairs & Northern Development. This historic signing was hosted by the Chippewas of Georgina Island in Ontario
- The Framework Agreement next required ratification by Canada, which Parliament completed with the passage and royal assent of the First Nations Land Management Act in 1999
- Ratification of the *Framework Agreement* by each signatory First Nation requires the community to draft and approve a land code
- January 1, 2000 the first day of the new millennium was selected by three First Nations as the date to begin operating under their land codes and exercising jurisdiction over their reserve lands and resources. These three were the first *Framework Agreement* signatories to implement land codes.
- In April 2003 the original 14 First Nations and Canada opened the *Framework Agreement* in response to requests from other First Nations
- As of April 2011 there were 58 signatory First Nations to the *Framework* Agreement; an additional 18 First Nations will become signatories in April 2012
- The number of *Framework Agreement* First Nations exercising jurisdiction under their land codes has jumped from 3 in January 2000 to 37 in January 2012.
- There are 65 other First Nations currently on the "waiting list" to be added as Framework Agreement signatories
- Canada is considering adding more Framework Agreement signatories after April 2012

Constitution

Article I Name

1. The name of the Society is the T'ít'q'et Economic Development Authority.

Article II Purpose

- 2. The purposes of the Society are:
 - I. To discuss, formulate and promote strategies and actions for sustainable economic development and renewal activities and opportunities in the community.
 - II. To provide advice and support to community based economic development and renewal initiatives taken by T'it'q'et members and its organizations and governance structures.
 - III. To participate in economic development and renewal activities as deemed necessary by its members.
 - IV. Assist in the preparation and implementation of an economic development strategy.
 - V. Organized and operated on a non-profit basis.

Article III Membership

3. Membership in the Society will be comprised of all registered members of T'ít'q'et.

Article IV Structure

- 4. The General Membership of T'it'q'et shall be the legislative body of the Society and shall be composed of all members.
- 5. The board of directors shall be the Administrative body of the society and shall be composed of 3 members elected by the General Membership and 2 members appointed by elected T'it'q'et Council.

Article V Elections

- 6. T'it'q'et members who are of voting age are eligible to nominate and cast votes for candidates for the board of directors.
- 7. Elections will be held every four years in accordance with T'ſt'q'et Election Code.

Article VI Executive

- 8. T'it'g'et members who are of voting age are eligible to serve on the board of directors.
- 9. The board of directors shall choose a Chairperson who is responsible to conduct meetings, prepare agendas and act as a spokesperson.
- 10. No director shall be remunerated for being or acting as a director or officer, but a director or officer may be reimbursed for all expenses necessarily and reasonably incurred by him or her while engaged in the affairs of the Society.

Article VII Meetings

- 11. Any member of the board of directors may call a board meeting, with a quorum of 3 board members.
- 12. All meetings are open to the T'it'q'et membership and shall be held at least four times per calendar year.

Article VIII Amendments

Signatures:

13. Amendments to the Constitution of the T'it'q'et Economic Development Authority can be made at a regular general meeting of the T'it'q'et membership.

This Constitution has been adopted by consensus on this date November 13, 2018 by the


The Land Code Coordinator started a youtube channel called 'T'ít'q'et Land Code'. There will be information videos shared on there in the future.



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T'ít'q'et Council Report January 2018

BC Rural Dividend Project Seton Lake IR 5

The BC Rural Dividend for Seton Lake IR 5 Development Phase 2 Preliminary Design project is ongoing. Ministry of Transportation has been slow in providing feedback for the project; therefore the project completion is set to the end of May 2019.

Aspen

The Aspen lease is near completion. Aspen sent comments on the lease to T'it'q'et and Canada on January 11, 2019. Canada is slow in responding. The next meeting set with Surrinder Ghog is February 7, 2019 to settle all remaining issues. The biggest substantive issue between the parties is the access Statutory Right of Way. This is an emergency access route through the mill site and the private lands held by Aspen. Aspen is also late in sending back their hand markup of the emergency access route so that the surveyor may complete the survey. Council is expecting to meet with the lawyer this week on this matter.

BC Hydro – Seton Beach Erosion Protection

The Seton beach erosion project was completed in December 2018.

BC Hydro - Transfer of Former IR 5 Lands & District Lot (DL) 1575

The lands have not been transferred yet due to the filled foreshore issues that the Province claims ownership. The erosion works had to be completed first then BC Hydro must obtain a crown grant of the foreshore. BC Hydro will then arrange for consolidation of the foreshore lot with upland Former IR 5. After creation of the larger parcel, BC Hydro will register charges again the property (Distribution Statutory Right of Way; Flowage Statutory Right of Way) and amend survey plans. Mandell Pinder has been instructed to proceed to take the land in fee simple, and then proceed with adding the land to the reserve. It is expected to take approximately two years for the transfer.

Mandell Pinder has also been instructed to transfer District Lot 1575 back as quickly as possible. BC Hydro will pay for the legal fees involved and the survey. T'it'q'et will have to pay property tax on fee simple land. The taxes are expected to be around \$9722.

ISC Ten year Grant Funding

T'ít'q'et made application to ISC for the ten year grant funding. This funding agreement will allow flexibility in allocating, managing and using funding to better accommodate local needs and changing circumstances and priorities. The First Nations Financial Management Board reviewed T'ít'q'et's application and made a recommendation to ISC for the 10 year grant funding. A response is expected from ISC within the next two weeks.

Specific Claims Updates

Below please find a brief update on the status of T'it'q'et specific claims work. We currently have six active claims on our work plan for T'it'q'et:

1. <u>Improper Sale of Seton Lake IR 5</u>
Mandell Pinder completed a draft claim and is awaiting the final items from UBCIC to incorporate into the claim.

We have ordered and are currently waiting to receive additional documents from BC Hydro (plans and land pur chases), INAC (timber files) and Library and Archives Canada (relating to membership). Some of these files have been sent and will be reviewed shortly. After Mandell Pinder has reviewed the supplemental research, they will add it to the claim and submit it to the Minister. After the claim is submitted, the Minister will have three (3) years to determine whether to accept the claim for negotiations.

Erosion of IR1 Adjacent to PGER Right of Way

This claim is currently with Mandell Pinder. Their legal review will be complete before the end of the fiscal year and they will provide a legal recommendations on how to proceed with the claim.

3. Fish Hatchery Obstruction of Seton Lake Reserved Fishery

This issue arose out of research conducted into Seton lake IR 5 and we have been conducting additional research on the issue. We are aiming to have documents gathered and reviewed by the end of the year. Mandell Pinder will then draft a claim for submission to the Minister and presented it to you for review and comment. When T'ít'q'et is satisfied with the claim, Mandell Pinder will seek a BCR to file the claim with the Minister.

4. <u>Alienation of Reserved Fishing Stations</u>

Research on this claim is continuing and the researchers aim to present the research report and all documents to T'ít'q'et and to Mandell Pinder by the end of the fiscal year. Mandell Pinder will then review the report and provide legal recommendations on how to proceed with the claim.

5. <u>Alienation of Water Rights from Dickey Creek</u>

Early document review and preliminary research are complete for this claim and in-depth research continues. The UBCIC researchers expect to begin writing this report in the new fiscal year.

6. Loss of village site town of Lillooet

UBCIC received a BCR to research this issue in July 2017. Early document review on this claim has been completed (basic documents gathered, and research plan developed) and research is progressing. Researchers expect to begin writing up the research in the new fiscal year.

Towinock Water

Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) has approved \$100,000 in funding for moving forward with an engineering assessment and the design of upgrades to the Towinock IR#2 water system, with a focus on improving the quality, safety and reliability of the water system. T'it'q'et will be working with Urban Systems Ltd. and several other sub-consultants to complete the project.

The current phase of the project will involve a condition assessment of the existing water system. This assessment will include a leakage assessment, testing of the two existing groundwater wells, and water quality analyses. This condition assessment will be completed in the coming months. A community meeting will then be held to review the recommendations made for upgrading & repairing the system and obtain feedback prior to completing the design of the proposed upgrades. The goal is to complete the design and apply for construction funding in 2019.

ISC Funding – LTC Impact Assessment Project

ISC approved the funding to complete an impact assessment on the consequences if T'it'q'et decides to leave the Lillooet Tribal Council. This review will identify the positive, negative, neutral and uncertain impacts from T'ít'q'et's perspective. This project will involve the three councils. The date set for the meeting with William Trousdale, Consultant is February 11, 2019 at 9:00 am in the Council Chambers.

Community Meeting

Next community meeting is set for February 24, 2019 at 10:00 a.m.

Department of Indigenous Services Canada (DISC) Income Assistance Policy Changes

Some legal and official changes with AANDC/INAC/DIAND name have now been changed to DISC (*Department of Indigenous Services Canada*). The provincial counterpart of Income Assistance has also changed to Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction (MSDPR). Additionally there have been some policy changes to the Income Assistance Program as well; all Chapter 10 (*Non-Status health benefits*) references to the Health Branch or Canada have been switched to the "*First Nations Health Authority*" (FNHA). All medical costs (on or off-reserve) for "Status" individuals are covered through the First Nations Health Authority (FNHA). This means that the income assistance program does not cover any "Status" medical costs, since FNHA does. For more information, please visit www.fnha.ca or call them at 1-855-550-5454. Only "non-status" Income Assistance clients living on-reserve are covered by policies outlined under Chapter 10.

<u>Chapter 3.1</u> Application process has been updated whereas; to include "work search time periods", in accordance with provincial MSDPR standards. Meaning, the application process now has several "Stages" whereas, Stage 1 "new applicants" must complete "satisfactory work search or are required to complete a work search lasting five (5) weeks" prior to receiving Income Assistance. Past recipients of income assistance or disability assistance "reapplying" for assistance are required to complete a three (3) week work search. Work Search forms can be downloaded from http://www.titqet.org/administration/social-development/ at the bottom of the webpage titled Work Search or you can pick up the forms from the T'it'q'et Administration office located at #59 Retasket Street.
